## ADA Transition Plan for City of Washington Public Facilities and Public Right-of-Way Facilities

In an effort to make the City of Washington's public and right-of-way facilities accessible to all, the City is in the process of updating their American with Disabilities Act (ADA) Transition Plan for the City. The update of the ADA Transition Plan demonstrates the City of Washington's commitment to providing equal access to all of its public programs, services, facilities, activities, pedestrian access routes within the right-of-way and includes sidewalks, curb ramps, street crossings, driveway crossings, rail crossings, hazards, and pedestrian activated signal systems for citizens with disabilities.

The Plan is intended to identify physical obstacles that limit the accessibility of facilities to individuals with disabilities, describe the methods to be used to make the facilities accessible, provide a schedule for making modifications to better provide access and identify the public official responsible for implementation for the Transition Plan.

### How to provide input:

Updating the transition plan process is currently underway and the City would like your comments and concerns regarding facility accessibility to assist in the development and updating the Transition Plan. - Other individuals and members of groups that encounter barriers related to transportation, such as parents of minor children with disabilities.
- People with experience and knowledge of ADA planning and requirements or also serve disabled populations.
- Interested City of Washington residents.
